MESSAGE FROM OUR SCHOOL BOARD CHAIR

As we started the 2021/22 academic year, the School Board had been in place for just six months, picking up the baton from the Transition Board, which had overseen Project Independence. As a result, much of 2021/22 was spent building a solid foundation upon which all aspects of our schools' governance structures could successfully operate. To support this, the School Board participated in several online training sessions with a School Board and Governance expert, who ensured we had the building blocks to deliver on our mandate effectively and appropriately. This was underpinned by the commencement of an overhaul of many policies and procedures in line with international school best practices while taking into account the requirements of operating in Thailand.

Our first big task was to welcome our incoming Head of School, Lural Ramírez, who joined UWC Thailand in July 2021. Like many things in 2021/22, this was a challenge as we navigated our way through online meetings and learning in the first few months. I extend the School Board's gratitude to Lural for her perseverance and optimism during this difficult and unpredictable time. I do not think there could have been a more challenging time to start a new job in a new country without the ability to connect with students and their families in person. Thankfully, as we moved through the first semester, restrictions did ease, and face-to-face interactions became easier. However, School Board meetings remained virtual for the duration of 2021/22 as a precaution.

Throughout the year, the School Board, proactively supported by our Head of School, engaged positively with the broader UWC movement, including joining the 50th anniversary celebrations of UWC South East Asia in Singapore, where both Lural and I met many of our colleagues from across the global movement for the first time in person, including the UWC International Office Executive Director, Faith Abiodun and International Board Chair, Musimbi Kanyoro.

All of this was only possible with the help of the Education for a Sustainable Future Foundation (ESF) and Banyapura Board, and most especially with the support, dedication and determination of all the staff at our school. To each and every staff member, the School Board also extends a heartfelt thank you for your continued passion and commitment to our vision and mission.

It is our staff and students who form the heart and soul of the school, championed by parents and guardians, and generously supported by donors and volunteers. It is this special collective which makes UWC Thailand a unique and inspiring school to be part of.

On behalf of the School Board, thank you all for your collaboration and commitment. Our mutual endeavours throughout 2021/22 enabled us to end the year stronger, more resilient and more determined than ever to make education a force to unite people, nations and cultures for peace and a sustainable future, and with an inspiring in-person graduation ceremony for our resilient Class of 2022.

SCHOOL GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE

From a governance perspective, our structure consists of two governing bodies; the School Board and the Foundation Board, and one land-owning body, Banyapura Limited. Additionally, we have to fulfil the operating requirements of regulatory bodies: the Department of Administrative Affairs under the Ministry of the Interior, the Ministry of Education and the Department of Business Development.

The UWC Thailand School Board is the direct governing body of the school and provides strategic, financial, legal and reputational oversight and leadership. The School Board is also responsible for employing and managing the Head of School, while the Head of School and the Leadership Team make all day-to-day operational decisions.

Foundation Board

UWC Thailand is ultimately owned by the Education for a Sustainable Future Foundation (ESF), a non-profit foundation registered under Thai laws. The ESF is governed by its own Board of Directors, which provides high-level oversight of UWC Thailand and Banyapura Limited, ensuring that the school remains focused on its long-term mission and vision. 



ENGAGEMENT WITH THE BROADER UWC MOVEMENT

Affiliation as a UWC affords our community the opportunity of ongoing global engagement. During the 2021/22 school year, we had numerous opportunities for such engagement:

Our governors and school leaders were supported with professional development opportunities through a visit from Roosmarijn Emmering, UWC South East Asia's Diversity Lead. Roosmarijn led Intercultural Development Inventory (IDI) training which supported our team's growth and development in alignment with our school-wide commitment to Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.

Our School Board Chair, Head of School and Chief Advancement Officer attended the **50th anniversary celebrations of UWC South East Asia (UWCSEA)**. This visit allowed our team the opportunity to engage with important thought leadership as attendees to the **UWCSEA Forum 'Learning to Shape the Future!'**

In January, UWC Thailand welcomed 24 students from UWC ISAK Japan. As part of the broader movement, UWC Thailand was able to step in to support these students when Japan faced insurmountable challenges during COVID. As a result of a call out to all schools, UWC Thailand jumped on board to support our sister school.



Our Development Committee attended the UWC Europe and Middle East and North Africa (MENA) regional meeting for National Committees in Turkey. Together with our Head of School and Chief Advancement Officer, our team made significant inroads regarding fundraising and engagement with National Committees.



Global administrative meetings abounded throughout the year, with our Head of School, Chief Advancement Officer, Director of Admissions, Marketing and Engagement, Head of IB Diploma Programme Admissions and National Committee Liaison Manager, Communications Manager, Director of Business Operations and Human Resources Manager all engaging in regular collaborative efforts with UWC entities around the world.

Our **partnership with UWCSEA** allowed us to bring a **second Afghan female refugee scholar** to our campus for entry 2022.

Engagement with our alumni

Almost 60,000 UWC alumni live around the world, giving our graduates access to an unmatched global network. The UWC Thailand alums continue to grow globally, and we were thrilled to congratulate our first graduating class who completed their two-year Diploma Programme on our campus post-COVID-19. As the alum community expanded, our forms of connection to our alums grew. This year we launched the UWC Thailand Alumni Facebook and Instagram pages, and followers across these platforms continue to grow.

UWC Heads Retreat

The school was honoured to host the UWC Heads Retreat during the 2021/22 school year! With COVID restrictions still limiting the ability of all heads of schools and colleges to travel freely, our retreat was held through a hybrid framework. Five heads of UWC schools and colleges came to our campus while the additional 13 heads joined us online during our two-day retreat, including the on-campus presence of UWC's new Executive Director, Faith Abiodun.

Taking full advantage of our opportunity to work across campuses, we held daily 12-hour retreat sessions, tackling topics of shared interest:

- student selection and admissions criteria,
- education strategy within the UWC movement,
- The Harvard Impact Study findings and application of learning on our campuses,
- opportunities for further collaboration across campuses: divisional and departmental structures across campuses and global campus opportunities through technology integration,
- ongoing collaboration with the International Baccalaureate Organisation, including leading in curriculum development through an assessment pilot for the Diploma Programme.

Our visitors left us having lived the very best of the UWC Thailand experience, and eager to return to our beautiful campus and tropical island in the future.

LEARNING PROGRAMME: ACADEMICS

Primary Years Programme

Focussing on what and how children learn, our Primary Years Programme concentrated on teacher training and professional growth to better understand how children approach the world with curiosity and how they employ their thinking and collaboration skills. This also allowed us to explore how children engage in 'student agency' (a student's independent drive and initiative toward an area of interest). Emerging from the COVID-19 pandemic, we took the opportunity to strengthen our commitment to outdoor education and service.

Key outcomes from this focus were:

- A strengthening of our co-teaching model and integrated response to student interests and ideas.
- Outdoor classroom times included weekly explorations and connections between our natural environment, classroom learning, and purposeful actions students could take to connect meaningfully.
- Mini-X was a meaningful addition to our process-based learning, which developed the thinking, research and collaboration skills students will formally put to task at the end of grade 5 and the culmination of their Primary Years Programme.
- The Primary Years Programme Exhibition is always an emotional part of the primary year's journey for students, teachers and parents alike. The 2021/22 year brought unforgettable student projects, highlighting our students' strengths and interests.









Middle Years Programme

The continued growth of the Middle Years Programming saw significant changes, including additional transformative learning opportunities. As a result of these opportunities, our students were responsible for their transformation (heart, mind, body) and enabling their peers to do the same.

The increased transformative learning, mission and values-aligned education across grades 6 to 10 included:

More Interdisciplinary Learning across subjects

 The grade 6 'DocuMantaray' Interdisciplinary Unit shifted to include six subjects. The multi-subject approach empowered our students to be global citizens by creating digital stories that shared narratives about local issues and how to take action on these issues.

'Manta Time'

 The new 'Manta Time' structure, developed in the 2021/22 school year, was rolled out to grades 6 to 8. 'Manta Time' was designed to allow students with two periods a week to focus their learning on our UWC values through focused studies that include peacebuilding, conflict resolution and transformation, living peacefully, and living sustainably.

Our Mother Tongue programme and Personalised Learning Track

 These individualised learning pathways increased in popularity and demand among students over the 2021/22 school year!

Outdoor Education Camps

 The extension of the length of our campus was a huge investment by our board and leadership team, which is further evidence of our commitment to student learning. Extensions meant that grades 9 and 10 spent ten days away on camp!



Diploma Programme

The school year culminated with the successful, in-person graduation of our 47 grade 12 students, on the heels of two challenging Diploma Programme years marked by interruptions due to COVID. The arrival of 24 new students from UWC ISAK Japan in January 2022 brought even more incredible students into our community and expanded our course offerings for the class of 2023 to include Japanese and Film studies.

In June 2022, our grade 11 students helped organise and run a fundraising event called Moonlit Melodies. In partnership with UWC South East Asia, UWC Thailand raised enough money to sponsor the academic costs of two Afghan female students. We are proud of the students who supported the scholarship fundraising efforts and forever grateful to our UWCSEA partners and their incredible community for their trust and commitment to positively impacting the lives of two female students from Afghanistan!

As we received our International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme results over the summer, we were incredibly proud to see that two students *received a diploma* score of 44.

They were a National Committee selected student and a student who has been at UWC Thailand for 13 years.

CLASS OF 2022 GRADUATION

In May, the graduation of UWC Thailand's class of 2022 was a celebration of the many successes of 47 graduates. It also recognised the resilience, kindness and unity the class had shown throughout a challenging two years. Their journey through the Diploma Programme years included 49 days of in-person learning, 66 days of online learning, and 202 days of hybrid learning (students both in-person and online).

TRANSFORMATIVE AND HOLISTIC EDUCATION: SPORTS

The 2021/22 school year marked a year of triumphant emergence from COVID and our athletes took advantage of the opportunity to return to competition. Two highlights included: Aniqah, grade 12 (*Sri Lanka*) who swam in the Tokyo Olympic games and Nicolas, grade 10 (*Germany*); Joaquín, grade 10 (*USA/Mexico*) and Siena, grade 7 (*Australia*) for their impressive individual and team finish in the Supersports Laguna Phuket Marathon 5k road race, with Siena crossing the line as the first woman out of a field of 364 female participants!



Sport growth and development: Sailing Programme

The UWC Thailand Sailing programme has gone from strength to strength. The Primary School Sailing Squad was at maximum capacity, while the newly launched Secondary School Sailing Squad had a decent uptake for its first season.

Our UWC Thailand Sailing Squad began competitive participation for the first time in O'pen Skiff Regattas and other sailing competitions on the island and around the world. The programme's goal is to make sailing available four days a week in the following academic years.





TRANSFORMATIVE AND HOLISTIC EDUCATION: OUTDOOR EXPERIENTIAL EDUCATION

Committing to Outdoor Experiential Education is an essential part of the UWC Thailand experience. For students of all ages and stages, the school provides powerful, periodical, and meaningful opportunities to develop skills that will last a lifetime. We saw significant facilities and curriculum improvements during the 2021/22 school year.

The UWC Thailand Outdoor Education Centre

The establishment of UWC Thailand's Outdoor Education Centre was quickly followed by us attaining International Sailing School Association accreditation. Our Outdoor Education Centre, located at The Playyard, allowed us to improve upon existing programming by enabling us to offer more frequent opportunities for students to engage in Outdoor Experiential Education experiences.

Outdoor Learning Initiative

A new Outdoor Learning programme for pre-school to grade 1 students was launched during the 2021/22 school year. This initiative included access to two national parks, which allowed our younger students to have weekly outdoor learning classes in a beautiful and accessible natural environment.

Camp and Expedition Structure

A new camp and expedition structure in our Primary and Middle Years Programmes took place during the year. We increased the duration of the camps and the length of time spent away from home and added elements of personal challenge to the Middle Years activities on camp. Additionally, camps were structured in a way that more closely aligned programming with the Outdoor Education Units of Inquiry for Primary Years Programme students.

United in a common purpose, our community of students, boarders, scholars, staff, alumni and parents is a diverse and vibrant group.





STUDENT LIFE

We value our boarding students and want to ensure they have a home in boarding that brings them comfort and joy!

Our Boarding House underwent restructuring and renovation during the year. We increased the main residential space capacity from 84 to 104 beds to accommodate transfer students and to allow for growth. The renovations of the new lounge and deck allowed the Boarding House to host several community events throughout the year. It also offered a new space for learning to take place, and a greater opportunity for all students to visit and enjoy the Boarding House facilities.

COMMUNITY ACTION

In October 2021, UWC Thailand was notified by the Andaman International Company that a pig slaughterhouse project was being planned to be built near our school.

On 18 November 2021, our School Director, Kru Kanok Chupak, attended the first public hearing, raised our concerns, and submitted our appeal letter to governmental organizations in Phuket to help us stop the project.

While we appreciate the need for regulated slaughterhouse facilities as an essential part of the meat production process, we were opposed to the establishment of a slaughterhouse facility in the chosen location due to the following:

- Negative impact on health and safety
- Negative impact on the local aquifer that feeds our wells in the community, including excessive water use and potential groundwater contamination
- Negative impact on the economic development in our area
- Negative impact due to mixed-use zoning allowing incompatible development and quality of life and business- with an impact on currently existing businesses and families, including a mosque, a temple, our school, and a Health and Wellness Center, among others
- Negative impact on the maintenance of a peaceful learning environment around our school.

We reached out to our broader community for support, who, as always, rose to the occasion by joining us at a peaceful protest to stop the development in our area.

Between November 2021 and January 2022, our Head of School, Lural Ramírez, met and collaborated with Kru Kanok and other neighbouring business owners, developers and community members to coordinate efforts in opposition to this proposed project in our area.

We are relieved to report that the slaughterhouse project has since been halted and no further development has taken place.



Participating in this protest was really insightful because it showed me the power of social change. To be surrounded by our community of parents, staff and students for a cause that doesn't align with the sustainable mission and values of UWC taught me the importance of standing up for what is right and our success showed me that making a difference is possible.

SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT AND EXPANSION

The 2021/22 school year was hallmarked by ongoing growth and development.

At the beginning of the year, 350 students were enrolled, but by the middle of the year, most grades had reached capacity. Enrolment and boarding numbers increased rapidly throughout the 2021/22 school year.

Our number of enquiries doubled while the attrition rate dropped by half from the previous year, which confirmed our programming and visioning met the needs and desires of current students and prospective families. Due to the increased demand for enrolment, our School Board approved the opening of a second section in most grade levels, effective during the 2022/23 school year.




